When I suggested this to my friend, she was thrilled. I know her son, but have never met his bride. So, I suggested that this handkerchief be a "Mother of the Groom" handkerchief. She could carry it in his wedding, and if and when the couple decide to have a child, the handkerchief can be converted to a Christening Cap with a couple of artful folds and ribbons... an Instant Heirloom!! She was delighted with the idea, and so I got to work on it.



The wedding was August 11. I was able to finish the handkerchief well ahead of time (in early July) and gave it to her right away. She has looked at it enough to know that she wants to have it framed with a picture of the Bride and Groom, in such a way that it can be taken out of the frame and made into a cap if desired.

It was very satisfying for me to be able to make something to enhance her experience of the wedding!
