## The Wistory and Structure of Handmade Lace

Handmade lace was a luxury textile of amazing complexity, beauty, and diversity. Its history over the last 500 years can be witnessed in paintings, which were often portraits of the elite in their finery, and traced through examples of antique lace from the Wadsworth Atheneum's Costume and Textile collections and pieces from the presenter's own collection. An appreciation of the many types of lace is gained from understanding the ways in which lace was made, and from viewing details of different kinds and designs. Following the talk, the audience will have the opportunity to see bobbin lace and tatting being done, and to examine pieces of antique lace, some as old as the 16th century.
